CO-COORDINATOR SPEAKS AT CIVIC CLUB MEETING

Francis Shurling Tells Exchange Club City Should Establish "Model City."

"The people of Albany have the opportunity to build a town along constructive-planned lines, which will make for a city the best laid-out and one of the most beautiful in the United States," said Francis Shurling of Atlanta, co-coordinator of government agencies, yesterday at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Exchange Club.

Mr. Shurling, who is here to aid Albany in its rebuilding, spoke to Exchangites in the absence of Tracy Augur, widely known city planner, who was scheduled to address the civic organization. In stressing the importance of taking advantage of the services and aids offered the city to construct a "model town", the co-coordinator pointed out that industries go to a town which is rebuilt on modern lines and shows signs of continued progress.

The usual business discussion of the club was dispensed with, on the suggestion of President Doug Brady, to allow time for the talk.

Quintard Wright, city manager, introduced the speaker, explaining that Mr. Shurling instigated the movement to obtain the services of the Reconstruction Finance Committee and several other federal agencies to aid tornado-stricken Albany.

Mr. Shurling stated that real-estate values in the city had increased since the twister descended and that with the construction, or re-construction, of the town on planned lines, the values would remain up.

To aid the beautifying of the city, Mr. Shurling pointed out, Alfred Kastner, of Washington, internationally known architect, had been secured to insure harmony in new business structures. Concluding, the co-coordinator emphasized that it behooved Exchangites and themselves of the services and opportunities which, besides making for a greater and better Albany, would tend to

enrich personal values of Albanians.

In a short talk, Mr. Wright outlined the civic building program, which was endorsed by the city commission Wednesday night. He also gave an account of the damage suffered by city property in the wake of the tornado, and estimated the possible financial expenditure necessary for repairs.

CITY PLANNER SPEAKS TO MEMBERS OF EXCHANGE CLUB

Alfred Kastner, Famed Architect, Stresses Acquiescence On Part Of Merchants To Follow Planners' Suggestions

Alfred Kastner, world famed architect, yesterday at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Exchange Club at the New Albany Hotel stressed a volunteer movement on the part of merchants of a city to follow suggestions of city planners assisting in beautifying a town declaring that a city built on a model design suggested by an architect tends to increase the value of the merchants' stores and makes a better display of them.

In his talk to the Exchangites, Mr. Kastner briefly reviewed the story of city planning, pointing out developments in work accomplished and the increased value of the city planner profession from its origin in 1880 to date.

C. Q. Wright, honorary member of the Exchange Club and Albany City Manager, in introducing the speaker, explained that other than material damage was suffered by Albanians. He pointed out that the estimated loss incurred by citizens amounted to approximately three million dollars of which only one million was covered by insurance. The remaining two million dollars of damage must be absorbed by the citizens of Albany, the city manager said. He expressed appreciation to the government agencies for sending experienced men to aid in rebuilding the city and voted that with this proffered assistance was included a financial buffer through a spending program to further the building of a better constructed and more beautiful town. Doug Brady, club President, gave a short report of the Board of Control meeting last week and advised members that there is a vacancy on the board to be filled. A committee was appointed to obtain a nominee for the vacancy. Mr. Brady also explained that the board would meet once every two weeks in the future.

BROSNAN SPEAKS ON RECONSTRUCTION AT EXCHANGE CLUB

States That "By May 1 An Enormous Improvement In Appearance Of Business Section May Be Seen"

"As early as May 1 Albany will have shown an enormous, marked improvement in the reconstruction of the business section, though it may take the balance of the year to get all the mercantile section rebuilt," Fire Chief D. W. Brosnan said yesterday in discussing the rebuilding program of this tornado swept city at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Exchange Club in the New Albany Hotel.

Beginning his talk with a resume of the twister emergency and the work done by the members of

the fire department immediately after the tornado struck, the fire chief said that never before had he seen people of a city jump so quickly to the aid of the distressed as Albanians did the morning of the storm. He also stated that never before had a city rehabilitated itself as Albany did to so quickly bring order out of chaos.

Mr. Brosnan, also building inspector of the city, noted the difficulties that have to be overcome in this reconstruction period. He said that though, as in any major movement, the building program necessarily runs into by-ways and minor obstructions, Albany is coming out of its disaster to build a better appearing city and one that is many times safer.

Stating that the reconstruction program calls for a modern, uniform business section, the chief pointed out that the demand was also being made for better-constructed buildings. Working on the basis of the same building code used in past years, the building inspector stated pamphlets containing essential building points have been issued to property owners repairing or rebuilding storm-swept constructions.

Mr. Brosnan pointed out that practically Albanians have offered 100 per cent co-operation, the majority realizing that the extensive improvements in the city, though expenditures aren't designed to run to excessiveness, may cost a little more, but in the long run will pay dividends. A report of the committee appointed by Exchange Club President Doug Brady to nominate a member to fill the vacancy on the club's Board of Control, named Jim Porter Watkins as nominee. A vote by members elected Mr. Watkins to the board.

A discussion of projects preferred at the Interclub Council meeting Monday night was made by Exchangites who attended.

GIVES HISTORY OF EXCHANGE CLUB

John Ventulett Tells Members Of Organization Here And Progress Of National Exchange

A short history of the Albany Exchange Club and a brief resume of the progress of the national organization since it was formally organized in 1911, were given by John Ventulett, member of the entertainment committee, in a talk before fellow Exchangites at the weekly luncheon meeting of the club in the New Albany Hotel yesterday.

Mr. Ventulett pointed out that since the Albany Club received its charter in 1936, it has made an enviable record in civic achievement service, though finding it necessary to overcome numerous difficulties.

He explained that the club was given its charter with a membership list of 23 and has now reached its highest peak of enrollment, with 26 members listed. The Exchangite stated that out of the original 23 charter members only six remained active in the club today.

In his short resume of the history of the national organization, Mr. Ventulett stated that the Exchange Club, since its formation in 1896, known then as the Booster Club, had grown to become the largest national civic group in the country. He stated there are more than 800 clubs throughout the nation.

He said Exchange Clubs had national objectives as well as civic, and pointed out the outstanding record of the Exchange in its promotion of aviation. Since 1928 the Exchange Clubs have marked up more than 5,500 achievements in their fight for progressive aeronautics.

Doug Brady, Exchange President, announced that next week's luncheon meeting would not be held, the organization would meet with the Rotary Club.

A new method of arranging prizes for attendance at the weekly meetings went into effect yesterday.

A committee consisting of Fred Darby, Jack Dean and Spencer Walden was placed in charge of arrangements for the Exchange's participation in the Civic Pride and Progress Parade here later this month.

A team including Hoyt Edge, Proctor Johnston, Fred Sumter and William Binns was named to represent the club in a "quiz" program to be held at the Albany High School tonight, participated in by the civic clubs of the city and sponsored by the Woman's Club.

At the Exchange Board of Control meeting last night, President Brady brought out the recently originated "garden plan" sponsored by the club. The project of 10 garden lots has been laid out on Eighth Avenue, and the club has chosen a boy to work each lot. The Exchange is furnishing the seed and equipment for the gardens and assisting in an advisory capacity to the youngsters, who will be given prizes for the best lot, Mr. Brady pointed out. He explained that the purpose of the movement is to aid in the character building of youth and to promote better workmanship and citizenship relations.

The control board announced last night that it will sponsor one of the good-will baseball caravans to the city in which the Albany Cardinals play its opening game of the season in the Georgia-Florida League. It was reported that the city selected would be announced later.

NATIONAL EXCHANGE SECRETARY TO SPEAK BEFORE LOCAL CLUB

Herold Harter To Be Guest At Dinner-Meeting Wednesday Night

Herold M. Harter, Secretary of the National Exchange Club and in charge of the organization's National Headquarters at Toledo, Ohio, will be the principal speaker at the dinner meeting of

the Albany Exchange Club Wednesday night at 6:30 o'clock in the New Albany Hotel. The visit of the national secretary, one of the two living founders of the National Exchange Club, was announced today by Douglas Brady, President of the local club, who stated that Secretary Harter's visit here, would be one of the few visitations he could make before Exchange Clubs in Georgia during 1940.

Mr. Harter is in charge of the administrative work of the National Exchange Club and has, since the inception of National Exchange in 1917, directed the growth of the Exchange movement from its small beginning to its present size. According to President Brady, Secretary Harter is a speaker of considerable note, with a wide range of information and acquaintanceship with national affairs and leaders. In the past few years he has covered thousands of miles visiting Exchange club meetings, conventions and district conclaves.

Under his leadership, stated the local president, The National Exchange Club program of objectives has been developed and has earned for Exchange nation-wide recognition as a powerful force for community betterment and for civic helpfulness.
